



THE ECHO EXHIBITION


From the 4th to the 7th of April, the small Bulgarian town of Veliki Preslav suddenly became very lively. Exhibitions, installati ons and performances by artists from different countries engaged in topics about the wars, tragedies, mourning and traumatic events in the history of the region. A half-destroyed former socialist era hotel was chosen as a location for the events, enhancing the mark on the lives of local people

The hotel was built with the common efforts of local people, with their volunteer work during past times. Years later, the important events in locals lives were also held in the building: Graduation proms, weddings, anniversaries.

The events in Veliki Preslav are preceded by one-month residence in Macedonia and Serbia work with young people from several Bulgarian schools (we told you more about them in our previous reports), besides: filming and editing a documentary, and a special invitation to photographers from Bulgaria and selection of photos for the exhibition.

The goal of the team was to provoke people in a deliberate encounter with the past. To put the focus and the attention onto the ruin and sorrow that occurred after conflicts and devastating events. In an effort to overcome the grief, talk about these events, but also with the important appeal "TO NEVER HAPPEN AGAIN".

The meeting of the artists after their residences in Macedonia and Serbia once again opened wound s and dark memories. It was interesting to see the point of view of the team - Caravan project Greec e, which filmed the documentary "Black Vein", in which the authors associate the Danube River with a




The project also included students from the Vocational High School of Textile and Fashion Design in Varna and the Vocational School of Applied Arts in Smolyan. The young designers tried to interpret the theme of mourning common to the whole project by developing models of mourning clothes. The ir meetings with artists, talking with their peers from another school, is likely to serve new projects and collections.











The local audience was surprised by the participation in the exhibition of the two photographers - Stoyan Nikolov from Shumen and Ivan Grigorov, and their footage from the so called. "The Great Excursion" or the exodus of the Bulgarian Mohammedans to Turkey. This year marks the 30th anniversary of this dramatic fora lot of Bulgarians episode in history. Dustdried memories were recalled, and sadly with them the memory of the lost friendships were once again recovered. Stoyan Nikolov (a photographer who documented the events in the region) told how he needed to hide while he was shooting the panic and the departure of these people.



The interest of the local people was enormo us. The nostalgiaand the curiosity of the hotel's transformation took most of them out of their apathy and caused them to speak, to remember, to take out the forgotten sadness.

Visitors to the exhibition had thechang e to engage with the art from 9 am to 8 am, coming to relax and to view the pictures and installations. As the mayor of the city - Mr. Alexander Gorchev noted at the opening: "People obviously need art, and they want it to be close to them, not to the glamorous and slightly pretentious galleries.".
